HEATH LANDS NEW UPSCALE RESTAURANT IN THE RESERVE

The Heath City Council approved an Economic Development Assistance Agreement and Ground Lease at its January 14 meeting for 1880 Kitchen, a new upscale destination restaurant in The Reserve, located along Hawk Drive and Chris Cuny Parkway.

1880 Kitchen - named in recognition of the year Heath was established - is owned and operated by Heath resident and successful restauranteur Agron Dika, whose other restaurants include Giovanni's at The Harbor in Rockwall.

The Council's action followed months of work on the project and approval of the agreement and ground lease by the Heath Economic Development Corporation (HEDC) and Heath Municipal Benefits Corporation (HMBC) Board.

"We're very excited to welcome 1880 Kitchen to Heath," said Justin Saunders, president of the HEDC/HMBC. "This is a distinctive project that fits our vision for high quality commercial development in Heath and in The Reserve. Not only does Agron have a proven record of providing customers with an exceptional experience, but he loves this community as much as we do."

1880 Kitchen will be a full-service signature restaurant of at least 5,500 square feet with a spacious outdoor patio and open space adjacent to the trail connecting FM 740 to Chris Cuny Parkway. Trails leading from Towne Center Park, now under renovation, also connect into The Reserve and 1880 Kitchen's site.

The menu will offer a sophisticated blend of contemporary grill dishes with a focus on quality ingredients.

The restaurant is projected to provide a boost to the City's annual sales tax base and bring 70 to 80 new jobs.

The Economic Development Assistance Agreement provides a \$500,000 loan to be paid back through a quarterly payment of 2.5% of gross sales. The Ground Lease terms include an annual lease of \$2500 with the option to purchase the property at today's market value of \$500,000 within five years. If the purchase option is not exercised, the lease will revert to the current market value in year six.

Serving on the Board with Saunders and Zilinskas are Cynthia Allen, Douglas Barkley, Glen Hettinger, Myles Hunter and Rich Koepke. Mayor Jeremiah McClure is the Ex Officio.



OUTDOOR WARNING SIRENS

As the City continues to focus on preparedness, outdoor sirens are needed to encourage citizens to seek shelter during severe weather such as tornadoes.

SIREN 1 & CONTROL SYSTEM

Donated and installed by Ryan Joyce, developer of The Estates of Bristol Valley on McDonald Road. This new neighborhood entered the City's planning process as part of the Lakewood Meadows Preliminary Plan in 2019.

SIREN 2

Approved for purchase by City Council to be installed near City Hall in 2025.

SIREN 3+

Additional sirens will be funded in a phased approach to provide Citywide coverage.



NEW PUBLIC WORKS FACILITY

A Groundbreaking Ceremony will be held on February 27 at 11 a.m. for the new Public Works Facility on the current City-owned site at 1284 FM 740.

STREETS & ROADWAYS

An analysis of the City's street conditions was conducted by a third-party expert.

The results provide the intelligence for City Council to revisit the 2018 Road Thoroughfare Plan and develop and fund an ongoing repair program.

A Transportation Subcommittee has been formed to address issues relating to the City's street network and ability to move traffic. Councilmembers Scott Dodson, Rich Krause and Brent Weaver volunteered to serve on the committee.

FINANCIAL STEWARDSHIP

Finance and Public Works staff successfully secured over \$100,000 in a FEMA grant reimbursement for Disaster Storm DR-4781 (May 2024).

The storm required an enormous response from Waste Connections and unexpected expenditures by the City to help citizens clean up by subsidizing their bulky brush collection fees.

The grant provides critical recovery funds for the future and strengthens the City's resilience and financial stability.

We also received an anonymous PATH donation to support a City Hall beautification plan that includes refurbishing the exterior monument sign, hardscaping the entrance/exit corners and extending sidewalk connections to tie into City trails.
